- Requires probably 2 leaders / patrol.

Much as I would like to turn back the clock and have the energy and enthusiasm to recreate the past, it is gone and we must now create a new future for Northland Scouting.


What plans we make as a Zone and what we achieve for Northland youth will be and must be a team effort with every-one contributing and playing their part, however small.

Casting about for some fun



Although the weather looked gloomy in the morning of March 1st, it brightened up in late afternoon ready for a beach fishing evening on Opito Bay beach for 21 young Kerikeri Scouts. Many Scouts remember planting little trees at Opito Bay on Matariki when they were Keas, learning canoeing when they grew into strong Cubs. They were all excited to be at Opito Bay again

trying fishing, instructed by Leaders like Sparrow, Karaka, Hawk, Sparks and Koru; of course, also parents like Denese, Robert's Mum and Shaun, Matilda's Dad.

Scouts were all so eager to cast their fishing lines when the tide was in, so hope was high. A little patience was needed for Scouts to learn how to set up fishing lines, the sinkers and the







"yummy but stinky" bait.

Two important safety rules were re-enforced to make sure that there would be no human casualties before catching fish. Firstly, always organise fishing lines and hold rod vertically when walking around; secondly, make sure other "fishermen" were at a safe distance when casting a fishing line.

A bit of good luck landed upon Sean Larsen very soon when he got two snappers in a roll. Such good luck was contagious. Rees and Guide, two boys originally from Asian





countries, who were fishing right beside Sean also started to catch snapper. For Rees, this was his first time ever to catch fish in New Zealand. He could not contain his excitement and kept saying, "This is the best night out ever." After Sean's Dad Bruce (Koru) changed the bait from squid to soft bait for Rees, he got a few more snapper. Six was the record for the night (Rees). Of course, any undersized "babies" were carefully returned to the sea. Jack Sadgrove, a seasoned Scout, was very busy all evening but not at fishing. He has been running left and right of the beach the whole evening delivering bait to other "fishermen". Jack earned a well deserved badge for the "Scout of the night".



Fish or no fish, it was a fishtastic night out thanks to great effort of all the Leaders and parents.



On Saturday 3rd March, Keas from Shackleton and Dargaville visited the Scouts at Northland Zone Regatta at the Kai Iwi Lakes.

Scouting skills on display at annual Kai Iwi Lakes Regatta

SCOUTS New

four sections Keas, Cubs, Scouts
and Venturers.

On the weekend of 2 to 4 March over 250 Scouts and Venturers from Northland, Auckland and as far south as



Hamilton, travelled to the Kai Iwi Lakes for the annual Northland Zone Regatta which has taken place for nearly 20 years.

Scouts compete in two age groups - junior 10.5 to 13 years and intermediate 13 to 15.5 years and the Venturers compete as seniors 15.5 to 18.5 years.

Saturday morning saw the Scouts and Venturers participating in a three-person kayaking relay. The rest of the day was a rotation of theory and practical



seamanship challenges and cutter and sunburst sailing. Sunburst's are sailed by two, while cutters have a crew of approximately three to four depending on age and experience.

Sunday started with everyone competing in an Ironman competition. Teams of five

kayaked, swam and ran through the water and up and down the beach. For the rest of the morning the Scouts and Venturers competed in cutter rowing races.



Throughout the weekend

the Scout Groups were also judged on their camping standards. The groups were judged on a variety of elements including their gateway, tent setup, hygiene and safety. Doubtless Bay Scout Group won the camping standard competition with a near perfect score.

1st Dargaville Scouts, a land-based group, also participated at Northland Regatta. They won the Saturday pioneering challenge to build a lookout tower.

The Top Non-Sea Scout Group trophy was won by Puhoi Air Scouts and the Top Visitor Group trophy went to New Lynn Sea Scouts from Auckland. The overall weekend and the Shackleton Harpoon was won by Whangarei based Sea Scout Group Shackleton Sea Scouts.



Shackleton Sea Scouts attended the 28th National Regatta in Wellington over new year. They competed as a combined Shackleton Bucklands Beach Contingent, placing 3rd in New Zealand out of 21 contingents.
